

On 10 August 2021, Greater Sydney Parklands (GSP) held a community webinar about the Waterfront Revitalisation in Callan Park. A short community survey was available for webinar participants to complete after the webinar. A total of 193 respondents completed the survey.

What you told us

You told us you value and want to protect the following parts of Sydney's parklands, for this generation and the next: Preserving and support biodiversity in our parklands



Large and natural open green spaces with diverse landscapes and trees, that are free and accessible for everyone to enjoy Recognising and retaining the history and heritage of the Parks and acknowledging First Nations connection and sites.



Trees and shade to provide cooling and comfort



Parklands unique and central location, particularly providing a backyard for increasing high-density communities.



Retaining the natural beauty and topography of parklands and not overdeveloping them



Retaining parklands as public and accessible assets for the community.











You told us the GSP can best meet the needs of our diverse communities by:



Actively engaging and consulting with community to ensure their needs, interests and desires are met.



Ensure parklands are easy to access, safe to use and welcoming for all users. Keeping open spaces natural, unstructured and well maintained.



Providing a diversity of spaces including areas for quiet relaxation, family friendly spaces for picnics and BBQs, areas for walking, jogging and cycling, and areas for dogs and their owners.



Recognising the history and heritage of Callan Park including First Nations people as the traditional owners of the land and their culture, the important history of Callan Park as a psychiatric facility and the heritage buildings within the park.



Providing ways community can be involved in the management of our parks



Providing a range of facilities to support recreation such as cycling paths, natural walking tracks, footpaths, sport fields and equipment, exercise equipment, as well as accessible amenities including toilets and bins.



Retaining parks as public assets for the community to access.

We asked you what activities you would like to see at Callan Park.

The top five responses include:



Bush regeneration activities



Open house events showcasing restored heritage buildings



Exhibitions in the Summerhouse



Community festivals



Music concerts

"Making sure Callan Park remains a place accessible for everyone as it is now including dog walkers', and retaining the beautiful trees. This is important for physical and mental health as it was originally designed for. We don't need a theme park."

> "I wouldn't like to see the space get taken over by events. I feel passive recreation is the most organic use of the space without the need to artificially increase the number of people coming to the park."

"The longer term aim should be to restore the heritage buildings to appropriate uses such as art gallery, museum, orchestral and other musical events for public performances, and explanations of the colonial history of the buildings and park."

"Annual public meeting on site to allow users, visitors, residents to stay involved with the park, its progress and to allow for the protection and non commercialisation of the parklands. This annual meeting to inform and update the community on the mental health and education facilities on the parklands."

"Gainful usage of the buildings that does not impinge on the offleash use of the general area." We asked you how you would like to have Callan Park's heritage acknowledged. The top five responses include:



Physical interpretation - eg. signage or materials

"Allow us some space and freedom, don't overdo it! The beauty of this place is that it looks council free and community owned."

"Good restoration and maintenance of all heritage

buildings"

"Keep as mature and reserved as possible"

"Competitions of photographic and Art exhibitions inside cottages showcasing historical photos museum and mental health education."

"Writer and artists in residence - citing Abbotsford Convent."









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You told us you would like:



Passive recreation spaces for walking, picnics and BBQs, gatherings with friends and family, relaxing and enjoying nature.



Separated and wider pathways for different user groups such as walkers and cyclists.



Dog walking, dog off-leash areas and access to the beach for dogs, as well as amenities including dog dispenser bags, bins, water taps and bowls for dogs, and a dog friendly café.



Retaining open, green and natural landscapes in Callan Park to support biodiversity and natural habitats.



Areas for exercise and active recreation including sports, walking, jogging, cycling, and swimming.



Play spaces and facilities for children and young people, including skatepark and pump tracks.



Amenities including bubblers or water fountains; seating and tables; accessible toilets; bins for general waste and recycling; and increased lighting at night.



Aquatic facilities and amenities such as kayak and paddle board hires, launch jetty, storage, board walks.



Cafe, kiosk or restaurant.



Community activities such as artistic workshops, native walks, yoga classes.



More trees and shade for cooling and comfort.



Recognition of the history and heritage of Callan Park, both Aboriginal heritage and sites as well as its historic use as a psychiatric site.



Accessibility for everyone of all ages and abilities.



You told us your top 10 priorities for Callan Park Waterfront are:

Bushland and biodiversity protection

Walking paths

Off-leash dog areas

Aboriginal Cultural interpretation

Accessible for all abilities

Tree planting and maintenance

Cleaning/ litter removal

Gardens and flowers, and

Heritage conservation and interpretation.
